What is SLT tea-trolley training?

- SLT is Speech & Language Therapy
- Tea-trolley training originated at RUH
- Bite-size training (5-10 mins) brought to staff, students & parents
- Single subject
- Reward of tea and cake!
- Training items on top shelf and edible goodies on bottom shelf

How did we adapt it?


- Uses equipment already available on the unit
- The equipment wasn't just to show but was used in a practical session
- Edible rewards were in the staffroom, rather than on the trolley
- Leaflets given to staff to take away as pocket-sized reminders

Advantages

- Can be taught at cotside
- Has an MDT focus
- Very quick way of teaching something which can be put into practice immediately
- Adaptable/flexible to fit the needs of a busy unit and its staff
- Flexible to caseload unit and SLT caseloads
- Short
- Reaches a high number of staff in a short time period
- Includes student nurses & midwives & student nannies

Disadvantages

Very easy to drop it if unit is busy;
needed senior staff buy-in

- Early communication
- Impact of teat flow rates on feeding (where parents have made an informed decision not to breastfeed)

- Enjoy the practicality
- Rate highly not having to plan to attend training
- Helps them provide better care
- Practice Educators value the attendance register kept by SLT
- Short enough to include staff on night duty
- "I've learned such a lot in a short time thank you!"

Feedback from parents

- Very practical
- Love being able to practise immediately with their baby
- Value the written information so they don't have to remember everything
- "Why don't all parents know about this? It's so good!"





Graph shows, for each quarter


- number of training sessions
